Steps + Checklist to help you add diversity into your storytelling.

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Steps to Take

Understand the importance of diversity: Recognize the significance of representing diverse backgrounds, experiences, and perspectives in children's stories.

Educate yourself: Learn about different cultures, religions, races, family structures, and disabilities through books, articles, and personal narratives.

Research and authenticity: Conduct thorough research to ensure accurate and authentic representation of diverse groups, avoiding stereotypes and generalizations.

Create diverse characters: Develop well-rounded characters that reflect diverse racial backgrounds, religions, family structures, and abilities.

Avoid tokenism: Give diverse characters meaningful roles and storylines beyond their diversity attributes.

Seek feedback from sensitivity readers: Engage sensitivity readers from the communities you are representing to ensure respectful and accurate portrayal.

Use inclusive language: Use inclusive and respectful language when describing diverse characters and their experiences.

Celebrate individuality: Emphasize the uniqueness and strengths of diverse characters, celebrating their differences as assets.

Embrace intersectionality: Consider how different aspects of identity intersect, representing characters with multiple layers of diversity.

Challenge biases: Address biases and stereotypes by portraying diverse characters in positive and empowering ways.

3. Have I portrayed diverse family structures (e.g., singleparent families, blended families)?

4. Are there characters with disabilities, and are their experiences accurately portrayed?

5. Have I avoided stereotypes and generalizations in my descriptions?

6. Did I consult sensitivity readers from the communities I am representing?

7. Have I used inclusive language throughout the story?

8. Does each diverse character have a well-developed personality and storyline?

9. Are diverse characters represented as heroes and protagonists, not just supporting roles?

10. Have I celebrated the uniqueness and strengths of each diverse character?

11. Have I challenged biases and stereotypes by portraying diverse characters positively?

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
